The series will provide policy makers, practitioners, analysts, and academics with in-depth analysis of fast-moving topics that require urgent yet informed debate. Wherever possible, arguments will be set within an appropriate theoretical and/or historical context—but all authors will ensure that their books have practical application. The series will accept arguments from all theoretical perspectives written by political scientists, sociologists, anthropologists, and historians—whether working in a university context, government, an NGO, or the military.

Topics will include:

- regional conflict and security—with a special focus on Asia, the Middle East, and Latin America
- specific threats to global security, such as proliferation, weak states, non-state violent actors, cyber warfare, enforced migration, crime and terrorism
- military doctrine and strategy
- intelligence reform
- all aspects of political conflict and its resolution—including civil disobedience, civil war, diplomacy, and human rights.

While single- or coauthored books are the preferred format for titles in the series, edited volumes may occasionally be accepted where the market is deemed large enough to support them.

The exigencies of rapid publication—that is, simultaneous release of a book in print and a range of electronic formats within four to six months of receipt of a contracted manuscript, which has passed peer review—require that manuscripts not exceed 80,000 words. Illustrations are permitted so long as they are of high resolution, in black and white, and with all permissions cleared in advance. To expedite publication, Cambria Press will generate the index page numbers for authors who need only provide a list of terms.

Advance contracts will be offered to authors following review of a prospectus and sample chapters by the RCCS general editor and the director of Cambria, and that contract will be ratified following receipt by Cambria of two blind reviews of the whole manuscript that recommend publication.
